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Documentary on Boris Pahor Screened in MD and PA

Slovenian documentary "The Stubborn Memory" (Trmasti spomin) about a centenarian Slovene writer, holocaust survivor and Nobel literature prize nominee, Boris Pahor, has been presented this week at the seventh annual international film series Bridges to the World, organized by the World Artists Experiences. The series introduces every year free screenings of five international films, this year, one each from Ukraine, Chile, China, Israel and Slovenia.



Boris Pahor addressed for the occasion to the American audience a letter, read in both Slovene and English.

The series has been running for five weeks from the first week of February through the second week of March at five venues throughout the state of Maryland and in Reading, Pennsylvania. Each film was introduced, screened, and followed by a discussion.

The Slovenian film The Stubborn Memory has been shown in California, MD, on Wednesday, March 5 at the Southern Maryland

Higher Education Center and yesterday in Annapolis, MD, at the Maryland Hall for the Creative Arts, when around 170 people attended the event and the discussion that followed. For the occasion, Boris Pahor, who will celebrate his 101th birthday in August, addressed a letter to the American audience.

The documentary, which received an Erasmus EuroMedia award and a medal of excellence in

2010, showcases the key moments which marked the author's life and present the core of his literary creation. The film was made as a part of a "Sons of Two Nations - Great Men of Slovenia" project, which presents the lives of people who have made an impact in the multi-cultural area between Italy and Slovenia.

The Stubborn Memory was directed by Tomaž Burlin, who was also the co-author and co-

scriptwriter, together with Neva Zajc, under the patronage of the regional center Koper-Capodistria of the national broadcaster RTV Slovenia. The screenings in Maryland and Pennsylvania were made possible as a courtesy by the same Regional TV Program.

The acclaimed author and a living witness to the horrors of 20th century totalitarianisms, Pahor is a member of the Slovenian minority in Italy. He grew up in

Trieste, where he witnessed the persecution of Slovenians by the Fascists before WWII, was imprisoned by the Nazis during the war and was banned from entering Slovenia by the Communists after publishing an interview, in which fellow writer Edvard Kocbek spoke about summary post-war killings.

Pahor is considered one of the most renowned Slovenian writers. He is best known for his novel "Necropolis" (also available in English translation by Michael Biggins), describing his experience of the Nazi labor camp Mittelbau-Dora near Nordhausen, Germany. He is also known for his collection of novels entitled Grmada v pristanu (The Bonfire on the Quay), and the novels Nomadi brez oaze (Nomads without an Oasis) and Spopad s pomladjo (A Difficult Spring).

Consular Hours in San Francisco

The consular officer from the Embassy of the Republic of Slovenia in Washington, DC, will hold consular hours and provide consular services (authentications, certifications, passport applications, etc.) in San Francisco on Monday, March 24, 2014, at the premises of the Honorary Consulate of Slovenia in San Francisco, 354 Pine Street, Third Floor, San Francisco, CA 94104.

To schedule an appointment, please, fill out the form available at the embassy's website and send it to the Embassy of Slovenia at vwa@gov.si by March 20, 2014, to allow the embassy enough time to verify your data.

The embassy will suggest the time of your appointment and give you further information on the documentation you need to bring along. You may

also visit the embassy website <http://washington.embassy.si/> (Consular Affairs, Visas) for documents required for most consular services. Please note that the consular fee must be paid with a money order made out to "Embassy of Slovenia". Cash, personal checks or credit cards will not be accepted.

Due to security reasons, prior appointment is needed to enter the premises of the consulate.

European Parliamentary Elections 2014

President of Slovenia, Borut Pahor, has called by a decree for elections to European Parliament on May 25, 2014. This will be the third E.U. elections for Slovenian voters since the country joined the E.U. in May 2004. Slovenia has in the European Parliament eight representatives, who serve for a five-year term.

The national electoral commission launched the official preparations and procedures connected to the elections on February 24. Slovenian citizens may vote in the European Parliamentary elections if on the date of the election (May 25, 2014) they are at least 18 years old.

Citizens with permanent residence abroad will receive their ballots along with the instructions at their respective postal addresses. Voters who wish to vote on the premises of the Embassy

of Slovenia in Washington, D.C. can check their data registered in the national electoral register from March 10 to May 9; Monday to Friday between 9:30 a.m. and 12 noon by phone at (202) 386-6614.

Slovenian citizen living outside Slovenia temporarily and wishing to cast their votes for Slovenian representatives in the 2014 European Parliamentary elections must register as voters by April 24, 2014, on a special registration form available at <http://www.dvk-rs.si/index.php/si/obrazci-za-volivce>. Thus, they will be able to vote by mail or in person. The polling stations in the United States will be established at the following locations with operating hours from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election:

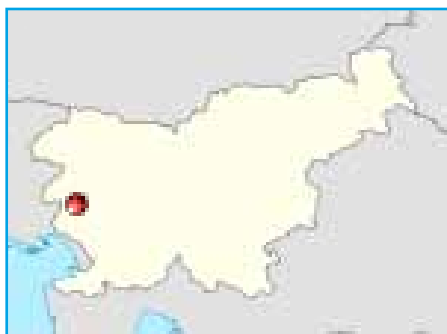

The Banjšice Plateau



The Karst world of the Banjšice Plateau, which rises over the Goriška Plain and sweeps in the west down to the emerald green river Soča is the ideal spot to retreat from the daily hustle

and bustle. This area between the regions of Goriška and Friuli on the one side, and the Tolmin and Idrija-Cerklje area on the other, was in the past a melting pot of cultures, and hence today impresses with its cultural heritage as well as with its nature that offers a marvelous view of the Julian Alps. With the seasons, the Plateau changes its appearance. In spring, a visitor is enchanted by the birds singing and in summer by its exuberant biotic diversity, in autumn it is time for mushroom picking and in winter one can breathe some fresh air

and feel the bora wind and the snowdrifts.

The best trail to take is the one which starts in the Grgar basin in the shelter of the Sveta Gora sanctuary. Not far away, there is the village Grgarske Ravne with its Herbal Center, which one should definitely visit. A stroll through the herb garden is also warmly recommended. In the settlement Bate, one should not miss the Habjani Farm with its architectural heritage and where a guest can try the ecologically produced cow-cheese and cottage cheese.

Leaving the main trail in the direction of Kanalski vrh, a visitor will get a glimpse of the artificial lake -- a retention reservoir. Continuing along the main road, after some serpentine bends, there appears a beautiful scene of grassy slopes and meadows full of cattle. The Banjšice Plateau here opens up with all its charm and offers astonishing panoramic views on the summits of the Julian Alps.

The village of Banjšice, after which the whole plateau got its name, consists of a number of clustered hamlets, which can all be embraced with our eyes. Beside all the natural beauties, one can come also across numerous remains of First World War, since the eleventh battle of the Isonzo took place right here.

A visitor should take time for a snack at the overlook point or just visit the nearest inn in the hamlet of Lohke. Time permitting, one should climb up to the village of Kal nad Kanalom, where in the quiet solitude, at some distance from the village, stands St. Thomas's church, built in the 15th century. Even higher, lies the village of Lokovec,

which extends itself in a narrow strip along the whole eastern part of the Banjšice Plateau. This part of the plateau, with its highest peak of Mt. Lašček (1071m; 3505 ft.), is the most karstified (rich in karst phenomena) and mountainous area here. This territory gets its mystical touch also from the finds of the gravel-stones kačje glave -- snakes' heads, discovered by Pavel Medvešček and Rafael Podobnik.

The village of Lokovec is known for its blacksmiths' trade, since more or less every farmstead

had its very own. A presentation of this old trade can be admired in the small Blacksmith Museum. Descending from the village, the deep-cut Čepovan valley between the Banjšice and Trnovo Plateau opens the way in the direction southward down to the village of Grgar and then further on to the town of Nova Gorica. Jasmina Cibic: Fruits of Our Land

The film presents a recreation of a 1957 parliamentary debate between politicians, architects and art historians, set up to decide which artworks might be suitable (i.e., nationally representative enough) to 'decorate' the newly built People's Assembly.
